

Transition to ICD-10

Countdown to October 1, 2015

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Effective October 1, 2015, the entire U.S. health care system will transition to using the ICD-10-CM code set. This transition comes on the heels of the release of the DSM-5 in May 2013, which has been adopted by payers and direct service organizations at varying speeds. Does ICD-10 Apply to Me?

Transitioning to ICD-10 is required for everyone covered by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). This change not only affects those who submit Medicare or Medicaid claims, it also affects diagnosis coding for both inpatient and outpatient procedures. However, this change does not affect procedural (CPT and HCPCS) coding. Click [here](#) for more information.

Who Needs Training?

It is suggested that administrators, information technology specialists, clinicians, and coding professionals all receive ICD-10 training. Key Points

- DSM-5 contains all of the information needed to assign HIPAA-compliant, valid ICD-10-CM codes to the psychiatric diagnoses.
- Codes can be found in parentheses within the diagnostic criteria box for each disorder in the DSM-5.
- According to the DSM-5, if more than one code can be assigned to a disorder, the codes can be found at the bottom of the diagnostic criteria box. This is the case when subtypes are coded. For instance, for schizoaffective disorder, the depressive type is coded as F25.1 and the bipolar type is coded as F25.0
- For disorders with more complex coding, coding notes and coding tables are provided at the bottom of the criteria box. The substance/medication-induced disorders, for example, have complex coding
