    - FAQs: Provision of Methadone and Buprenorphine for the Treatment of Opioid Use <u>Disorder in the COVID-19 Emergency</u>: In response to the Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) pandemic, SAMHSA is providing answers to Frequently Asked Questions regarding the provision of methadone and buprenorphine for the treatment of Opioid Use Disorder for new and existing patients.
    - <u>COVID-19 Guidance for Opioid Treatment Programs</u>: SAMHSA is offering guidance on pharmacotherapy for opioid use disorder availability in circumstances in which patients may be exposed to highly contagious infectious agents (such as COVID-19).

# CITY, COUNTY, AND STATE NEWS

STEUBENVILLE, OH: Steubenville to launch mental health court: Municipal Judge John Mascio likens those who end up in his court due to mental illness or substance use disorders it to a "revolving door," one he clearly hopes to close by launching a Mental Health Court — an intensive program of supervised probation for those offenders diagnosed with serious to severe mental illness and whose mental illness led to the commission of the offense for which they were convicted. Mascio said he's already obtained \$60,000 in grant funding for this year, and has applied for certification from the Ohio Supreme Court as a mental health court. Once it's certified, he said the mental health court will be subject to reporting requirements. He said they'll be eligible to apply for grants each year through 2024. He said it's going to be an intensive program, which will require offenders to regularly report to the court and confirm compliance with court ordered treatment on a weekly basis. He anticipates "substantial taxpayer savings" will result: Municipal Court's program of intensive probation for drug and alcohol offenses, in place since 2014, has already seen jail costs drop from \$120,000 in 2014 to \$79,000 in 2019. He said he's hoping to get the mental health court operational within the next 90 days.

OVERLAND PARK, KS: Launching a new mental health program for high school students: Overland Park announced the launch of WellConnect Teens, a student assistance program for high school students. Now available nationally for the upcoming 2020-2021 school year, the program offers students access to short-term online therapy, web and mobile-based self-management tools and student/life resources through a dedicated teen line. WellConnect Teens provides a safe and confidential way for students to get help when they need it most – at no cost to them. The program can help students learn healthy habits, cope and face challenges like relationship issues, academic performance, anxiety, depression, substance use, bullying, trouble sleeping and more. The program helps teachers too – a dedicated Faculty and Administrator Support Team (FAST) hotline is

available 24/7/365 for administrators and staff members to talk with a clinical consultant about how to best support students struggling inside or outside of the classroom. The program is an expansion of a successful pilot program in partnership with Greenbush - The Southeast Kansas Education Service Center, an educational cooperative serving learners of all ages through partnerships with schools, communities and agencies statewide. WellConnect Teens services are available to eligible students ages 13 and older at participating high schools; online therapy for minors requires parental consent

WORCESTER, MA: Worcester To Have State's First Modular Building Of Micro-Units To House Chronically Homeless: The Worcester Housing Authority has received approval and funding from the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development to build the first-in-the-state modular building of micro-units to house people who've been chronically homeless. The property will feature 25 studio apartments with kitchenettes and bathrooms — 24 for people who've been chronically homeless and one unit for a residential manager. A case manager will work out of an on-site office to help residents manage their finances and stay connected with services, including mental health and addiction treatment, according to Worcester Housing Authority Executive Director Alex Corrales. The state awarded \$2.2 million toward the project that is estimated to cost \$3 million, Corrales said. The remaining cost will be covered by city dollars, funding from the Massachusetts Housing and Shelter Alliance (MHSA)'s Home & Healthy for Good program, and debt to be taken on by the housing authority.

**TENNESSEE:** *Tennesseans' mental health impacted from COVID-19:* A new poll says Tennesseans' mental health is being impacted from COVID-19. The survey taken by East Tennessee State University shows increased levels of anxiety and depressive disorder. More than half of people reported trouble sleeping and nearly 20% of people had trouble sleeping all the time. Another 53% of pollers reported they felt nervous, anxious or on edge. About 43% of people reported feeling depressed. One in five people reported having physical symptoms when thinking about the coronavirus pandemic, including sweating, trouble breathing, nausea or a pounding heart. ETSU cites the CDC as saying these are symptoms of anxiety or depression.

### Trump Administration Releases PREVENTS Roadmap to Combat Veteran Suicide

- On Wednesday, President Donald Trump released the <u>PREVENTS roadmap</u> to combat veteran suicide, which calls for "a nationwide public health campaign aimed at educating Americans that suicide is preventable," beginning this summer
- The President's Roadmap to Empower Veterans and End a National Tragedy of Suicide (PREVENTS) will
  focus on a holistic public health approach to suicide prevention seeking to change the culture
  surrounding mental health and suicide prevention through enhanced community integration,
  prioritized research activities, and implementation strategies that emphasize improved overall health

# National Institute of Mental Health Issues Notice of Special Interest Regarding Research on Risk and Prevention of Black Youth Suicide

The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), the National Institute on Minority Health and Health
Disparities, and the NIH Office of Disease Prevention have issued a <u>Notice of Special Interest to</u>
encourage research focused on Black child and adolescent suicide.

- Over the past several years, there has been a significant increase in the rate of suicide and suicide ideation and behaviors among Black youth. An analysis of data from 2001 to 2015 found that Black youth under 13 were twice as likely to die by suicide than their White peers, and the suicide death rate among Black youth was found to be increasing faster than any other racial or ethnic group.
- NIMH encourages research that addresses Black youth suicide and mental health. Topics of interest include but are not limited to:
  - Epidemiology, etiology, trajectories, for example, studies that examine the role of racial disparities in access to mental health services or studies that seek to understand the role of trauma in contributing to mental health difficulties and suicide ideation and behaviors.
  - o **Intervention and Services Research**, for example, studies about factors that cause or reduce disparities in outcomes in Black and Black LGBTQ+ youth.
  - Preventive Interventions, for example, research to inform understanding of the means younger children use for suicide, or research to examine the mechanisms by which interventions that target other outcomes impact mental health and suicide outcomes in Black youth.
  - Treatment Interventions, for example, studies that harmonize and integrate data from treatment trials to examine the impact of the interventions on mental health and suicide in Black youth
  - Services Interventions, for example, trials that develop and test technology-based approaches
    empirically targeted to Black children and adolescents, or that address challenges in service
    access, use, engagement and retention, quality of care, or setting issues that are commonly or
    uniquely experienced by Black youth.

## CFR Part 2 Rule Moves Through Office of Management and Budget (OMB)

- A rule on 42 CFR Part 2, which governs the privacy of substance use disorder records, has cleared the White House budget office, presumably to bring it into alignment with the changes in the *CARES Act*
- There are two privacy regimes in health care one, for most types of records in HIPAA and the other for substance use disorder records, in Part 2
- Many in the health care sector felt the Part 2 standard, which required explicit patient consent to share data, was overly restrictive and harmed patient care
- Bringing the Part 2 standard into alignment with HIPAA has been tricky, with advocates concerned about the risks of commercializing data or of that data being used by law enforcement
- The CARES Act resolved the argument by preserving Part 2 privacy restrictions outside of health care settings, while allowing patients to give revocable, one-time permissions to share data. The rule now presumably formalizes the change and fills out the details

# **CONGRESS**

# Congressmembers Cheri Bustos and Susan Wild Introduce Crisis Care Improvement and Suicide Prevention Act of 2020

- Reps. Cheri Bustos (D-IL-17) and Susan Wild (D-PA-07) have introduced the Crisis Care Improvement and Suicide Prevention Act of 2020.
- This legislation would direct states to use 5% of their Mental Health Block Grant funding for crisis care services to upgrade and expand crisis care programs

## Senate HELP Committee Hosts Hearing on Telehealth Reform

- Senate HELP Committee members during the first congressional hearing on telehealth's pandemicrelated boom indicated they're still in the early stages of understanding the implications from the rapid expansion in virtual care
- Senate HELP Chair <u>Lamar Alexander</u> on Wednesday called on Medicare to permanently lift restrictions on telehealth coverage in rural areas
- Other committee members said they would push for other changes in the next coronavirus relief package, including a bill that would expand telehealth coverage for behavioral health services.

### Bipartisan senators call for making telehealth expansion permanent post-coronavirus

- A group of 30 senators from both sides of the aisle wrote to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) and Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer (D-N.Y.) calls for provisions from the CONNECT for Health Act included in previous COVID-19 legislation be extended after the public health emergency is over
- "Americans have benefited significantly from this expansion of telehealth and have come to rely on its availability," said the lawmakers led by Sens. Brian Schatz (D-Hawaii) and Roger Wicker (R-Miss.). "Congress should expand access to telehealth services on a permanent basis so that telehealth remains an option for all Medicare beneficiaries both now and after the pandemic."

## Gallup Poll Shows U.S. Parents Say COVID-19 Harming Child's Mental Health
